HOW TO HAVE SEX

Tuesday 13 February, 2024 - MUBI, the global film distributor, streaming service and production company, has today announced a partnership with Molly Manning Walker's acclaimed, award-winning debut feature film *How to Have Sex* and the <u>Schools Consent</u>

<u>Project</u> - which will see the film shown to students in schools throughout the UK followed by a lawyer-led workshop on issues around consent.

Founded by criminal barrister Kate Parker, the **Schools Consent Project** is a charity providing workshops led by legally qualified volunteers designed to give young people agency, enabling them to fully understand the law around sex and consent in order to make informed and sensible decisions.

How to Have Sex, which was released in UK cinemas in November 2023 is a vibrant and authentic depiction of the agonies, ecstasies and ride-or-die glory of young female friendship. Capturing the highs and lows of being a teenager, Walker's debut starrs Mia McKenna-Bruce, Shaun Thomas, Lara Peake, Samuel Bottomley, Enva Lewis and Laura Ambler. In the film, three British teenage girls go on a rites-of-passage holiday, drinking, clubbing and hooking up in what should be the best summer of their lives. As they dance their way across the sun-drenched streets of Malia, they find themselves navigating the complexities of sex, consent and self-discovery.

From the early days of the production process, through filming, to the UK cinema release the film has been sparking conversations about the issues that young people face when navigating those first sexual experiences. Kate Parker immediately recognised how deftly the film examines themes of consent and sexual violence in a context that young people would easily identify with.

"The moment I first watched the film, I was struck by the obvious synergies with the charity's work. The film situates consent and sexual violence in relatable, everyday contexts that appeal to our students. Its scrutiny of things like body language, facial expression, tone, silence, excuses, peer pressure, alcohol etc are exactly the sort of things we discuss in our consent workshops. How To Have Sex helps us lift the lid on a topic that might otherwise be alienating or awkward. It enables us to have an open, honest conversation around consent and sexual violence, and it helps us give young people a language and confidence to articulate themselves."

"It's really a dream come true to be getting our film into schools. Watching it be used as a learning tool for consent has been the most emotional part of the journey for me. As we've taken the film around the world we've established that most women have had an experience like Tara. Now we get the opportunity to help teenagers navigate sexual

Since the film's premiere at the Cannes Film Festival in 2023, Molly Manning Walker's *How to Have Sex* has received vast critical acclaim and multiple awards, including the top prize in the Un Certain Regard section at Cannes;, the Philip French Award for Breakthrough British/Irish Filmmaker at theLondon Film Critics Circle, and the European Discovery – Prix FIPRESCI at the European Film Awards. The film is BAFTA-nominated for OUTSTANDING BRITISH FILM; OUTSTANDING DEBUT BY A BRITISH WRITER, DIRECTOR OR PRODUCER (*Molly Manning Walker*) and CASTING for *Isabella Odoffin*, who also won for Best Casting at the British Independent Film Awards. *Mia McKenna-Bruce*, winner of the Best Lead Performance at the British Independent Film Awards (BIFA) and Breakthrough Performer of The Year (London Film Critics Circle) is nominated for the *EE Rising Star Award*, the only award voted for by members of the public. The EE BAFTA Film Awards will take place on Sunday 18 February.
